

It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need. Implementation - Curriculum delivery, Teaching (pedagogy) and Assessment

Impact - Attainment and progress

The funding **should** be spent by 31st July but the DfE has stated that there will be <u>no clawback</u> of any unspent money so this can be carried forward into 2023/24.



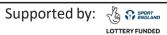

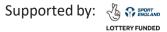
